



DOR HADASH'S 12th ANNUAL MLK, JR. DAY OF SERVICE *Tikkun Olam*—Repairing The World



What do racial justice, immigration, gun control and homelessness all have in common? They are all important issues that our community cares about. During our 12th annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day of Service last month, adults engaged in small group conversations about the issue of their choosing. They were encouraged to consider how our community can move forward in making a positive impact on the world regarding these issues. You can look forward to hearing about follow-up events based on those conversations. If you were not able to be here for our MLK Day and you'd like to be involved with one of these groups, please let me know and I will connect you with them.

Also during our MLK Day, children met with Gesher School teachers Giza, Holly, Mindy, and Marcia to explore their roles in making peace, helping others, and stopping bullying. For part of the morning, children and adults made scarves with loving tags tied onto each one that will be given to homeless women at Rachel's House. They decorated Hamsa signs to be given to families with a loved one in Hospice and door signs to be given to the seniors at Seacrest Village in Encinitas. They made hundreds of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for the homeless, and of course *mitzvah* bags which were filled to the top with wonderful supplies and snacks for those living on the streets. If you would like a bag or two to keep in your car, just let me know.

We welcomed a staff member from the Anti-Defamation League and a speaker from Jewish Family Service. We sang with Hilly Rubin and learned from Rabbi Yael about our role in gathering the shattered sparks to bring wholeness to the world.

Lastly, all attendees were encouraged to sign up to continue the work of *tikkun olam*, repairing the world, after our event ended. Cynthia and Judy helped clean up Hilltop Park, others served a warm meal on Monday night at Dreams for Change which provides a safe place in the parking lot at JFS for people living in their cars. We are encouraging members to sign up to feed the homeless at "First Saturdays" on the first Saturday of each month and also at father Joe's Villages every Sunday.



D'VAR TORAH—*Parashat Shemot* by Tamar Ladd presented on January 6, 2018



Parashat Shemot tells the story of the birth and early life of Moses, the son of an Israelite family who was saved from Pharaoh's decree to kill all the first born sons of Israel. His mother, Yocheved, resisted the edict, and hid him for three months until she could no longer hide him safely. She put him in a wicker basket and placed him among the reeds of the Nile. His sister Miriam watched over him and saw that he was found by Pharaoh's daughter. She took pity on the Hebrew baby whom she later adopted and named Moses, which means to "draw out of the water."

Throughout the *Shemot* Torah portion, we learn about Moses's experiences and character and that he becomes the Israelite leader who would free his people from bondage. What most intrigued me about this story was that Moses is an example of a great leader who is reluctant and doesn't want the job that he is asked to do. Despite his reluctance, he discovers that he already possesses all the important traits he needs to help free the Israelites from slavery.

Moses is depicted as a person who does the right thing and cares about the underdog. When Moses saw an Egyptian beating an Israelite, one of his kinsman, and saw no one around, he killed the Egyptian and buried him in the sand. Even though he probably did not intend to kill the Egyptian, Moses had the courage to stand up to someone in power, when he believed what they were doing was wrong.

Another time Moses is said to have witnessed two Israelites fighting and he stepped in to stop them. In this example, even though Moses may not have understood the circumstances of the conflict and one of the Israelites challenged his intervention, Moses sensed that there was likely another way to resolve their dispute, demonstrating a sense of justice.

Finally, Moses defended Tziporah and her sisters against shepherds who were driving off their flock from the well. In addition to helping out the women, Moses also watered the animals. In this example, Moses showed his compassion for the vulnerable.

Even though Moses decisively knew what to do when someone needed help, it was really interesting to me that when God asked Moses to go to Egypt and tell Pharaoh to free the Israelites, Moses asked God to pick someone else because he wasn't confident he could do the job.

When Moses told God,

"I can't do this,"

"pick someone else to help you," and

"I can't speak well, so no one will listen to me,"

those responses didn't fit Moses's character because of all the courageous acts he'd done in the past such as standing up to the Egyptian and defending Tziporah and her sisters.

So what then changed his mind and enabled him to become the leader that he had been earlier in life?

Moses gained confidence when God told him that his brother Aaron would go with him and when God gave him powers to prove to the Israelites and Pharaoh he was God's messenger and that the Israelites would be freed from slavery. Perhaps Moses remembered the ways he helped the oppressed in his earlier life as well. I think an important thing is that the Torah imagines that God told Moses that God would be there with him and would guide him on what to say and do. All those things helped Moses eventually follow God's command.

I can relate to Moses' reluctance to take on the harder leadership role, because I have felt the same way when faced with overcoming fears, and facing new challenges head on. Many of you know that I love circus skills and one of the hardest skills for me to learn was riding the unicycle because it was difficult to control the wheel and stay on the seat. When my dad told me that riding a unicycle requires a new kind of balance, and it is like learning how to walk atop a wheel, I started to realize that I already knew how to use different types of balance from walking with stilts, using the rolling circus globe, and doing flips on the trampoline. I gained confidence knowing that I had already developed the skills that would enable me to ride the unicycle. I knew that I may fall, but that I could learn how to fall safely. I would focus on good effort, not outcomes. And finally, as soon as I would master this challenge, I would be better prepared for bigger challenges to come. And yes...from our garage, emerged a very tall, chain-driven unicycle!

Literally—a bigger challenge.

When I was able to ride the tall unicycle, I felt very proud and happy. I had found the confidence to pursue my initial challenge, which led to achieving a skill greater than my original goal.

Moses eventually overcame his ambivalence and insecurity and led the Israelites out of Egypt. I hope in my life, when there is something that seems overwhelming, I will be able to find the confidence in myself, that instead of refusing to try, I will try to meet that challenge like Moses did. As I become a *bat mitzvah*, I think of the qualities of Moses that I admire and would wish to incorporate into my life, and follow his example. He showed his courage to stand up for what's right, took a stand against injustice, and showed compassion toward those in need and helped the less fortunate and vulnerable.


